Baby, it's cold outside

Ice storm cripples the Midwest over the holidays

This holiday season, the Midwest was hammered by a devastating ice storm that resulted in power outages, hazardous driving conditions and property damage.

Many Nebraskans were unable to enjoy their traditional Christmas celebrations because of the dangers involved with travel.

According to a press release from the Nebraska State Patrol, troopers were kept very busy responding to numerous reports of vehicles in medians and ditches over the holiday weekend.

In order to provide for the influx in accidents on the icy roads, the patrol provided approximately 33 additional troopers to be on duty throughout the duration of the year-end winter storms.

Even with the dangers of being outside, many still attempted to capture on film the beautiful scenery created by the layers of ice and snow.

However, despite the gorgeous photos taken by many across Nebraska, those working almost around the clock, like the State

Patrol, and those like Bob Heinz, general manager of Dawson Public Power District, saw a slightly different view.

In an interview printed in the Kearney Hub, Heinz said, "I look

around and I'm amazed at some of the destruction I see. You don't have to look far to see the damage is incredible."

The majority of this damage consists of downed power poles and power lines, as well as fallen tree branches.

This extensive damage is resulting in some very hefty costs for the state.

The estimated cost of erecting new power poles is approximately \$1,500 each. According to Heinz, the total cost of the damage thus far is around \$58 million.

Since the electricity is back on for the majority of Kearney residents, life is starting to get back to 'normal' again.

However, Kearney City Manager, Mike Morgan said in an interview with the Kearney Hub, "I don't know if anybody recognizes the severity of what happened."

Although improved weather conditions have allowed much progress to be made in cleaning up the aftermath of nature's fury, patience is still essential while the

cleanup continues.

In an interview with the Kearney Hub, Morgan stated that it "could be months" before Kearney is completely clear of downed branches and limbs along the streets.

Several suggestions have been made to citizens, requesting assistance in furthering the recovery process:

CONSERVE ELECTRICITY:
- Keep use of large appliances down to a minimum

- Turn off lights when not in room


- Shutdown computers when not in use

TREE LIMB REMOVAL:

- Pile fallen branches near the curb, careful not to disrupt traffic

- Or take limbs to drop-off sites at Centennial Park, Harvey Park, Nina Hammer Park, Ted Baldwin Park, or West Lincoln Way at 2121 30th Ave.

The storms are at bay for the time being, but the process of cleaning up the aftermath continues.



President declares national disaster for Nebraska

WASHINGTON – The head of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced that federal disaster aid has been made available for the state of Nebraska to supplement state and local recovery efforts in the area struck by severe winter storms during the period of December 19, 2006, through January 1, 2007.

FEMA Director David Paulison said federal funding is available to state and eligible local governments and certain private

nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis in the counties of Adams, Antelope, Blaine, Boone, Brown, Buffalo, Cedar, Chase, Cheyenne, Clay, Custer, Dawson, Dixon, Dundy, Fillmore, Franklin, Frontier, Furnas, Garden, Garfield, Gosper, Greeley, Hall, Hamilton, Harlan, Hayes, Hitchcock, Holt, Howard, Kearney, Keith, Keya Paha, Kimball, Knox, Lincoln, Logan, Loup, Madison, Merrick, Morrill, Nance, Nuckolls, Perkins, Phelps, Pierce, Platte, Polk, Red Willow, Rock, Seward, Sherman, Stanton, Valley, Wayne, Webster, Wheeler, and York for debris removal

and emergency protective measures, including direct Federal assistance.

Federal funding is also available on a cost-sharing basis for hazard mitigation measures statewide.



FEMA works closely with state and local emergency managers, law enforcement personnel, firefighters and other first-responders.

Paulison named Michael Bolch as the Federal Coordinating Officer for federal recovery operations in the affected area. Bolch said that damage surveys are continuing in other areas, and more counties and additional forms of assistance may be designated after the assessments are fully completed in the affected areas.

FEMA manages federal response and recovery efforts following any national incident, initiates mitigation activities and manages the National Flood Insurance Program.

FEMA became part of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security on March 1, 2003.



Dear Mike,

How do I do the endless 1-up trick in Super Mario Brothers 3?

-Needs more lives

I'll admit that this question was entirely made up off the top of my head due to lack of input from readers over holiday break, but it is still a worthwhile venture for all old school gamers.

To be honest, this information can probably be found on any gaming website, but I take pride in the fact that I figured this out all by myself way back in the day, and will save my readers the trouble of having to look this up.

At the beginning of Super Mario Brothers 3, the player starts out in Grassland. Quickly defeat the easy first level of the game and be sure to pick up the power-ups to become Raccoon Mario along the

way.
In Grassland level 2, run past the first pipe, there should be a Question Box right before the second pipe. Jump to the right of the second pipe, which should appear to be a conglomeration of two pipes. This pipe continually spits out Goombas (a basic enemy). Jump on the first Goomba and repeatedly press the "A" button to continue to float in the air.

Continue to land on the Goombas that come out of the pipe without touching the ground. The point values awarded for these will increase from 100, 200, 400, etc, all the way up to 8,000.

After the 8,000-point mark, each Goomba killed will award the player a 1-up. Also, if you find yourself getting behind in the jumping, there is a Para-Goomba (A Goomba with wings) just to the right of the pipe.

Land on him only ONCE to take away his wings, and he will boost you back up into the air. Then allow him to walk off the screen and his wings will come back, giving you an endless supply of extra jumps to avoid touching the ground.

If you mistakenly hit the ground, you can simply start again with the 100, 200, etc, and begin obtaining more 1-ups in a matter of seconds.

Now, the timer on the level clock will probably run out before you reach the maximum of 99 lives.

No worries, you will only lose one life for this. Simply run through the level and get the first Mushroom and then the Super Leaf to become Raccoon Mario again and continue the 1-uppage.

Also, if you're playing with a partner, be sure to let the second player have a shot at this trick, as well. If you clear the level, it will be impossible to play it again. Just fall down a pit on purpose and let your partner gain some 1-ups, as well.

This way you can both play through the game without worrying about the dreaded Game Over.

Also, this trick works in the first Mini-Fortress of Desert Land (the second world). There are three Dry Bones in the first room (Dry Bones is a turtle that cannot be killed and will always get back up and walk around).

Simply jump and float and land on the Dry Bones, and by the time you have landed on all three of them, the first one will stand up and can be jumped on again, increasing the point values to eventual 1-ups.

There may be other areas where this works. I would be eager to hear from any readers who discover them.

I take pride in creating possibly the biggest waste of newspaper space of all time for the vast majority of people. But for the few diehard NES fans out there, this should come as a helpful nugget. Peace out.


Duke Men's Lacrosse
