












The Antelopes played this game without Staab, Webb, James and Leggott, who were out with injuries.

Elm plunged over from the 4-yard line to give Kearney an 18-0 lead. Stutzman booted his only successful extra point.



Antelopes Edge Chadron



In the season's finale, the Antelopes traveled to Doane College. On a good football day, the Doane Tigers ran to a 46-19 win. Their fast balanced offense enabled them to roll up their 46 point total before Kearney could score. The passing of Anderson and the running of Zamba, Chapman and Summers paced the Doane attack.

Late in the fourth quarter Elm, Baker and Lindquist scored touchdowns for the Antelopes. Staab's passes were largely responsible for the belated Kearney comeback. Although the game was a dismal climax to the season, the Antelopes emerged with a respectable 5-3 win, loss showing.


Concessions of all types, a water show, skits, a dance, and a king and queen made the Christmas Carnival one of the main events of the year.


