
Would-be freshmen pay strict attention to business as they mark special exam sheets with their special pencils. In the history of our college no one has ever flunked his IQ test.




Our Campus Grows...


Student Union to be located directly across from Men's Hall

Nebraska State's Faculty: Helping To Create That Commodity Called An Intelligent Individual.

To name and honor the professors at Kearney who are at the top of their fields, a volume would serve better than these two pages. There are faculty members at Kearney who are not good instructors, but there are many more who are. And it must be remembered that a definition of the genius of a good instructor includes more than his teaching techniques. And though all are teachers, not all are scholars. Perhaps most irritating to the Kearney Student, is the lack of intellectual freedom he observes in the positions of his instructors. The instructor often precedes any discussion on a sensitive subject with the

words such as, "Now, don't misunderstand me, I'm not advocating what I say." And so on. The student is young enough to have ideals. He has not yet learned the near-sordid compromises that must be made in actual life. He may have observed, for instance, that there is cut-throat competition and repression of initiative in many careers, but he has not yet learned that that condition prevails in the near revered profession of a college professor. But he is also buoyed by the knowledge that there are many professors who refuse to make these compromises.



Professor Calvin T. Ryan is not afraid to make his students work. As Chairman of the English Department, Mr. Ryan is a master at holding a class audience. He evolves each piece of literature into a portrait as sensitive as his own. The English major and graduate values him as a warm friend and a competent judge. Mr. Ryan has been a strong public relations attribute for NSTC in his educational and religious talks on KGFW radio. To list all of his attributes here would be impossible. Through the years we will remember C. T. as a valued friend because we value what he gave.



As Chairman of the Industrial Arts department Otto Olson is one of the most devoted instructors of the NSTC family. Having first enrolled at NSTC in 1912 Mr. Olson later returned in 1919 and began teaching in the industrial education field. Over the years Mr. Olson has, through hard work and patience, developed the industrial education program at NSTC into one of the very best in the nation. Mr. Olson will retire as of September 1, 1957. It will not be as pleasant with him gone.

As Assistant Professor of Biology, Harvey Cole is by no means bound to the laboratory and classroom. He has always been fervently dedicated to all of the aspects of student life. 
F OOTBALL







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






CHRISTMAS WEEK

BOWLING LEAGUE GAINED LEGIONS









PRESIDENT


T RACK




SUMMER THEATER


CAFETERIA




STUDENT UNION

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
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
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
